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TWENTY-NINE HIGH SCHOOLS REPRESENTED IN ACT-SO COMPETITION Eleven Gold Medalists Advance to National Competition

(Wheaton, IL) – Students representing 29 area high schools placed in the DuPage County ACT-SO 36th annual Local Competition on Sunday, March 22. Sixty-four youth competed for top honors in Science, Business, Humanities, Performing Arts, and Visual Arts categories. ACT-SO – the Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics – is a year-long program designed to encourage high academic and cultural achievement among high school students of African descent. The program features three components: mentoring, academic enrichment, and a local competition.

"ACT-SO is not just about winning a medal," said Dorletta Flucas Payton, DuPage County ACT-SO Chair. "It is about the journey to the competition and the knowledge learned, personal growth, and the relationships developed."

Eleven students who won gold medals in 14 categories were acknowledged with other winners at the ACT-SO Awards Banquet. More than 600 parents, ACT-SO alumni, volunteers and program partners celebrated the hard work of the 2014-2015 ACT-SO class. DuPage County ACT-SO is a program of the DuPage County Branch of the NAACP and is sponsored by the College of DuPage and the DuPage Regional Office of Education. "Each of our partners contributes in a unique way to our success," said Payton. "We so appreciate the financial investments, as well as the time and talents representatives give to ensure our Olympians perform at their highest."

The national ACT-SO program has helped nearly 300,000 young people open new doors to learning and define career paths, since it was founded, 36 years ago. ACT-SO is the premier youth initiative of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). Today there are more than 200 ACT-SO chapters



around the country helping youth discover and develop academic and artistic talents. The ACT-SO competition is designed to recognize scholars in a manner often only reserved for entertainers and athletes.

In addition to celebrating the hard work of ACT-SO high school Olympians, the Awards Banquet honored middle school students who were part of DuPage County's Jr. ACT-SO program, launched during the 2014-2015 academic year.

Jr. ACT-SO focuses on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) subjects and careers, exclusively, and challenges students to work in teams to identify and solve a real-world problem. A total of 26 students from 17 schools throughout the Chicagoland area were part of Jr. ACT-SO's inaugural class. Working together, sixth, seventh and eighth graders learned about researching, technical writing, software coding, and team building.

Results of Jr. ACT-SO's February competition were shared with participants and others anxious for the news at the 2015 DuPage County ACT-SO Awards Banquet, Sunday.

"Jr. ACT-SO was a life-changing experience for my daughter," said parent, Kerrissa Murry. "She has transformed into a young confident leader; look I forward to her growth and development through ACT-SO."

The Aqua Marines, the Jr. ACT-SO gold-medal winning team, focused on the need for clean water for all people, and the impact on kids in specific areas of Africa. Knowing that they could not solve the problem in a few months, the Aqua Marines chose to take on the challenge to raise awareness of the global issue by developing a website, in hopes that today's 13-year old will develop a clean water solution tomorrow.
